Antibody Class: IgG1k

Mouse monoclonal antibody prepared against the Hantaan virus Gc (formerly G2) glycoprotein was affinity purified from clone 8E10 hybridoma supernatant using protein G magnetic beads. The B cell hybridoma was generated by the fusion of Sp2/0-Ag14 mouse myeloma cells with splenocytes from mice immunized with protein A sepharose-bound Hantaan virus glycoprotein-antibody complexes as described by Arikawa et al.¹

This reagent is part of the Joel M. Dalrymple – Clarence J. Peters USAMRIID Antibody Collection.

Material Provided:

Each vial of NR-36167 contains approximately 100 µL of purified monoclonal antibody in PBS. The concentration, expressed as mg per mL, is shown on the Certificate of Analysis.

Packaging/Storage:

NR-36167 was packaged aseptically in screw-capped plastic vials and is provided frozen on dry ice. The product should be stored at -20°C or colder immediately upon arrival. Freeze-thaw cycles should be avoided.

Functional Activity:

NR-36167 is reactive in indirect immunofluorescence assays using Vero E6 cells infected with Hantaan virus. Although clone 8E10 is reported to lack neutralizing activity against Hantaan virus,¹ NR-36167 is somewhat active in plaque reduction neutralization tests. See Certificate of Analysis for details. The antibody is also reported to function in ELISA, hemagglutination inhibition and immunoprecipitation assays, and to cross-react on Prospect Hill virus, Puumala virus, and Sapporo rat virus.¹
