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Product Description:

Genomic DNA was isolated from a preparation of Francisella tularensis subsp. novicida, strain CG62.

NR-3035 has been confirmed as non-type B by PCR amplification of an approximately 390 bp amplicon.^{4,5} Analysis of the 16S sequence indicates that NR-3035 is consistent with other strains of F. tularensis subsp. novicida. NR-3035 has been qualified for PCR applications by amplification of approximately 1500 bp of the 16S ribosomal RNA gene.

Material Provided:

Each vial contains approximately 4-6 µg of bacterial genomic DNA in TE buffer (10 mM Tris-HCl and 1 mM EDTA, pH 8.0). The vial should be centrifuged prior to opening.

Packaging/Storage:

NR-3035 was packaged aseptically in screw-capped plastic cryovials. The product is provided frozen on dry ice and should be stored at -20°C or colder immediately upon arrival. Freeze-thaw cycles should be minimized.
