Product Description:

NR-19352 is a preparation of genomic DNA from heat-killed *Mycobacterium leprae*, strain Thai-53 whole cells derived from infected armadillo liver and spleen tissue. DNA was extracted from whole bacilli by treatment with sodium dodecyl sulphate, Proteinase K and lysozyme, followed by freeze-fracture to disrupt the cell membrane. Extracted DNA was purified by phenol-chloroform-isoamyl alcohol (25:24:1) and chloroform-isoamyl alcohol (24:1) to remove contaminating proteins and polysaccharides. Genomic DNA was precipitated with isopropanol.

Material Provided:

Each vial of NR-19352 contains approximately 2 µg of lyophilized genomic DNA in Tris-EDTA buffer.

Note: Genomic DNA can be reconstituted in distilled water.

Packaging/Storage:

NR-19352 was packaged aseptically in plastic tubes. The product is provided frozen and should be stored at -80°C or colder immediately upon arrival. Freeze-thaw cycles should be avoided.
